

Overview:

Belfast is a city undergoing vast changes. For too long it was lumped in with the likes of Baghdad, Bosnia and Beirut as places to avoid! But it is now a far cry from that place and the bad old days of "the Troubles". Today, Belfast is a bustling and energetic city, and seems to be in a state of constant state of flux. A combination of hip hotels, impressive theatres and galleries, exquisite award-winning restaurants, and a great live music scene make it a vivacious destination.



Transport:

Airport:

Belfast International Airport is situated just 18 miles north-west of Belfast. Airport Express 300 operates a 24 hour service between the airport and Belfast with buses departing every 15 minutes for the majority of the day on weekdays, with reduced frequencies at off peak times and weekends. The bus leaves from the bus stop located opposite the terminal exit. A single ticket costs £7.50 and a return costs £10.50.

George Best Belfast City Airport. City Airport is located 2 miles north-west of the city off the A2. **The Airport Express 600** operates every 20 minutes from outside the airport to the Belfast Europa Bus Centre adjacent to the Europa Hotel, in the heart of the city. The service, Airport Express 600, operates between 5.45am and 09.50pm, and costs £2.50 single and £3.80 return.

Bike Hire/ Bike Tours:

www.belfastbiketours.com/bike_hire/ Belfast Bike Tours meet at the main front gate at Queen's University. Their tours run Monday/Wednesday/Friday and Saturday at 10.30am and 2.00pm. Bike hire is available 7 days a week. Rental will cost between £15+ daily and £15 - £60 weekly. Bikes come with a helmet and bike lock as standard. Buses:

Grocery shopping:

There is a **Centra** located on 66-70 Stranmillis Road which is only a 5 minute walk from Stranmillis College. You will find everything you need here from groceries to newspapers. There is an ATM in this store, and it would be the closest ATM to Stranmillis. In the city centre, there is a **Tesco Metro**, located on 2 Royal Avenue, Belfast, BT1 1DA. **Marks and Spenser's**, located on 48-52 Donegall Place is a more upmarket and expensive supermarket, and is located opposite Belfast City Hall.

Shopping:

Belfast has two main shopping centres in the heart of the city centre. Victoria Square Shopping Centre has plenty of clothing stores, food outlets and a cinema It is located in 1 Victoria Square, Belfast. www.victoriasquare.com. Castlecourt shopping centre is located on Royal Avenue, and contains several food outlets, clothing and homeware stores, pharmacies, opticians and department stores. A full list of shops can be found on http://www.castlecourt-uk.com/. St.George's Market, is located on 12-20 East Bridge Street, and is one of Belfast's oldest attractions having been built in 1890. This is a bustling spot every Friday- Sunday when it's doors open for a variety market on Fridays, City Food and Craft Market on Saturdays and the Sunday market.

Pubs and Clubs:

Brewbot: 451 Ormeau Road. Recently opened this summer, Brewbot is the first brewpup to open in Belfast! With a great selection of beers from all across the world, there is bound to be one you can take a liking to!



The Crown Liquor Saloon: 46 Great Victoria St. Known as one of the best bars in Northern Ireland, this bar is a great example of what a Victorian gin palace looks and feels like!

Activities in Belfast:

The Titanic experience - Titanic Belfast is the world's largest Titanic visitor experience and a "must see" visit in any tour of Belfast and Northern Ireland. It is located in Titanic Quarter, right beside the historic site of this world famous ship's construction. Housed in an iconic 6-floor building, this state-of-the-art visitor experience tells the story of the Titanic, from her conception in Belfast in the early 1900s, through her construction and launch, to her famous maiden voyage and tragic end. http://www.titanicbelfast.com/



Ulster Museum- located in the Botanical Gardens of Queen's University, the museum opened as the Belfast Natural History Society in 1821. The museum is home to a vast collection of history, art and natural sciences, and entry is free to all visitors. In 1998, the Ulster Museum, which includes Armagh County Museum, merged with the Ulster Folk and Transport Museum and the Ulster-American Folk Park to form the **National Museums and Galleries of Northern Ireland.**
